Industrial Insights Answer Key

1. Child labor involved young children working long hours in factories or mines; it was common because families needed extra income and factories sought cheap labor.
2. Labor unions organized workers to demand better pay, shorter hours, and safer conditions.
3. Child labor laws set minimum age limits and restricted working hours for children to protect their health and education.
4. People moved to cities seeking jobs in factories and better economic opportunities.
5. The factory system centralized production, using machines and division of labor to increase output.
6. Overcrowding, pollution, and lack of sanitation caused health problems and made life difficult for poor families.
7. Employers prioritized profit and there were few labor protections, leading to long hours and low pay.
8. The steam engine powered machinery, trains, and ships, allowing industries to expand rapidly.
9. Governments passed laws regulating working conditions and promoting public health improvements.
10. It led to technological progress, urban growth, and the development of modern labor rights and economies.
