Unfortunately, coral reefs are in danger due to pollution, rising ocean temperatures, and destructive fishing practices. When corals become stressed, they can turn white in a process called bleaching, which makes it harder for them to survive. Scientists warn that if reefs continue to decline, entire ecosystems and human livelihoods will be at risk. However, efforts like reducing pollution, creating marine protected areas, and using sustainable fishing methods can help reefs recover. Protecting coral reefs is not just about saving beautiful ocean scenery, it's about safeguarding biodiversity and the balance of the planet's ecosystems.
