- 1. Intensive "myself" emphasizes I but can be removed.
- 2. Reflexive "herself" is needed; she looked at her own reflection.
- 3. Intensive "herself" emphasizes mayor but can be removed.
- 4. Reflexive "themselves" is needed; they blamed their own group.
- 5. Intensive "himself" emphasizes he but can be removed.
- 6. Reflexive "itself" is needed; cat cleaned its own body.
- 7. Reflexive "ourselves" is needed; we did the designing to us.
- 8. Intensive "yourself" emphasizes you but can be removed.
- 9. Reflexive "themselves" is needed; players injured their own bodies.
- 10. Intensive "herself" emphasizes teacher but can be removed.
- 11. Reflexive "herself" is needed; she taught her own self.
- 12. Intensive "himself" emphasizes president but can be removed.
- 13. Reflexive "myself" is needed; I cut my own body.
- 14. Intensive "themselves" emphasizes children but can be removed.
- 15. Reflexive "itself" is needed; dog hurt its own body.
- 16. Intensive "ourselves" emphasizes we but can be removed.
- 17. Reflexive "himself" is needed; he reminded his own self.
- 18. Intensive "yourself" emphasizes you but can be removed.
- 19. Reflexive "themselves" is needed; they organized it alone.
- 20. Intensive "herself" emphasizes she but can be removed.

Teacher Notes / Guide

- **Key check**: Remove the pronoun.
 - o If the sentence still works → Intensive.
 - o If the meaning breaks or feels incomplete \rightarrow **Reflexive**.
- This activity helps students see that while intensive and reflexive pronouns look the same, their function in the sentence is different.
- Extension: Have students rewrite two reflexive sentences into intensive ones (and vice versa) to show mastery.
