- 1. Excerpt C (Smith presents himself as the reason Jamestown survived).
- 2. Positive relations supported by Powhatan gifts of food (Excerpt B).
- 3. Possible motivations: protect his reputation; seek credit; impress leaders in England.
- 4. Excerpt A often seen as more factual about colony hardships and work habits. Responses may vary if supported with reasoning.
- 5. Powhatan viewpoint missing; important for understanding conflicts, motives, and shared history.

- B: Possible Bias
- C: Likely Exaggerated and Biased

Teacher's Guide

Differentiation:

- Provide sentence starters for developing writers
- Allow oral responses or small group discussion prior to writing
- Offer background notes about Smith's writings and later historians' critiques

Engagement Strategies:

- Place students in "History Detective Teams" to compare notes
- Quick debate: "How truthful was John Smith?"
- Use color-coding to mark statements of opinion vs. fact

Extension Ideas:

- Read a short Powhatan account (if available) and compare perspectives
