A strong student response should:

- 1. Accurately connect Juneteenth's theme of delayed justice or equality to a modern issue (e.g., civil rights, education, fair treatment, representation).

- 3. Include thoughtful reflection-empathy, awareness, or a solution-oriented mindset.

Differentiation Tips:
