Teacher's Guide

- **Purpose:** Builds comprehension, historical understanding, and critical reflection about the evolution of work and workers' rights.
- **Differentiation Tips:**
 - *Grades 5-6:* Read the passage aloud and discuss key vocabulary (e.g., "Industrial Revolution," "labor union").
 - *Grades 7-8:* Encourage independent reading and deeper analysis of how social change happens.
 - *Grades 9-12 (Extension):* Compare working conditions across countries today or research a current labor rights issue.
- **Engagement Ideas:**
 - Create a "Then and Now" classroom display showing tools or jobs from the past versus today.
 - Hold a short debate: "Which job is harder-factory worker in 1850 or delivery driver today?"
- **Extension Ideas:**
 - Have students write a short journal entry from the point of view of a child working in a factory during the Industrial Revolution.
 - Encourage students to research a major labor law (like the Fair Labor Standards Act) and share how it changed work in America.
