Teacher's Guide

Quick Tips for Teachers:

- **Differentiation:**
 - For **Grades 8-9:** Provide sentence starters like "A new beginning means..." or "This year, I want to..."
 - For **Grades 10-12:** Encourage deeper introspection or connection to larger life goals or cultural parallels (e.g., New Year's resolutions, graduation transitions).
- **Extension Activities:**
 - Have students pair their journal entry with a visual piece—a symbolic drawing, calligraphy phrase, or short poem about renewal.
 - Encourage students to research how "new beginnings" are celebrated in other cultures and compare traditions.
