- 1. Marshall is referring to the Judicial Branch or the Supreme Court and other federal courts.
- 2. The courts have the responsibility to interpret laws and decide how they apply in real cases.
- 3. Judicial review allows courts to review laws and actions to determine whether they violate the Constitution.
- 4. It prevents any one branch from having too much power and ensures the law is applied fairly and consistently.
- 5. Students should mention that courts can strike down laws or actions that violate constitutional rights; a valid modern example earns credit (e.g., freedom of speech cases, protection against discrimination).

Teacher's Guide

- Judicial review emerged as a power of the Supreme Court through the *Marbury* decision.
- Marshall's words emphasize separation of powers and rule of law.
- Courts ensure that laws align with the Constitution.

Differentiation

- Support: Provide vocabulary definitions (province, duty, judicial, interpret).
- Challenge: Have students reference another Supreme Court case involving judicial review.
