Teacher's Guide

- Review examples of metaphors, similes, and repetition before reading the quotes.
- Read each quote aloud to let students hear King's rhythm and emotion.
- Discuss how figurative language makes speeches more memorable and moving.

Differentiation:

- Grades 6-7: Provide a mini word bank of figurative language types and effects (e.g., "inspires hope," "adds emphasis," "creates imagery").
- Grade 8: Challenge students to rewrite one quote using their own figurative language while keeping Dr. King's tone of hope and justice.
- Advanced learners: Ask students to connect King's figurative style to persuasive techniques in modern speeches or media.
