

## **Hidden Structure Clues**

Authors leave **clues** in their writing that show how the text is structured. These clues are often **signal words** or phrases. For example:

- Cause & Effect → because, since, as a result
- Chronological/Sequence → first, next, after, finally
- **Problem & Solution** → problem, solution, challenge, answer
- Compare & Contrast → however, but, both, alike
- **Description** → for example, such as, includes, in addition
