#### Teacher's Guide

### • Differentiation tips:

- Provide tone definitions or sample sentences for students who need extra support.
- o Allow partnered discussion before predicting tone.
- Have struggling readers listen to you read the openings aloud with expressive voice cues.

## • Engagement ideas:

- Turn the activity into a quick warm-up where students vote on tones by raising hands.
- Let students rewrite one opening sentence in a different tone to show how small changes matter.
