Five Senses Scene Answer Key

Teachers should check for:

- Clear evidence of **seeing**, **hearing**, **smelling**, **tasting**, and **touching** sensory details.
- A descriptive paragraph that fits the carnival setting.
- Logical flow appropriate for Grades 3 to 6.
- Complete sentences and relevant sensory words.

There is no single correct answer. The focus is on using all five senses accurately.

Teacher's Guide

Purpose: This worksheet builds descriptive power by requiring students to use all five senses in a narrative scene.

- Review the five senses before writing.
- Brainstorm sample sensory details as a class without using them in students' final writing.
- Encourage students to close their eyes and imagine the carnival.

Differentiation Tips:

- For emerging writers: Provide a table with five labeled boxes for each sense to plan first.
- For developing writers: Challenge them to add at least one **figurative** description such as a simile.
- Provide a sensory word bank that includes terms like bright, sticky, cheerful, echoing, sweet, salty, whirling, bumpy.

Engagement Ideas:

- Play short audio clips of crowd noise or cheerful music to spark imagination.
- Show a simple carnival-themed image without giving specific sensory details.
- Let students share one sensory detail aloud before writing.
