Teacher's Guide

Purpose: This worksheet strengthens students' ability to use dialogue purposefully in a narrative.

- Review the basics of dialogue punctuation: quotation marks, commas, and new lines for new speakers.
- Model a brief example of characters speaking that relates to a shared discovery or problem.
- Encourage students to plan what the characters might say before drafting.

Differentiation Tips:

- For emerging writers: Provide sentence starters like "I whispered...", "My friend asked...", or "We shouted...".
- For developing writers: Challenge them to include two short exchanges of dialogue or to show emotion through speech.
- Offer a mini word bank with terms like whispered, asked, replied, wondered, shouted, noticed.
