

Dutch Economy Focus Answer Key

1. It is a major entry and exit point for goods traveling to and from Europe, making it one of the busiest ports in the world.
2. Goods move by rail, road, or river routes to reach other European countries.
3. Examples include flowers, dairy products, and vegetables.
4. High-tech greenhouses allow farmers to grow large amounts of food efficiently, supporting export industries and providing stable production.
