

Timeline To Narrative Answer Key

Strong student responses should:

- Follow the timeline events in the exact order given.
- Add descriptive details, actions, and transitions such as **later**, **after that**, **as she arrived**, or **soon**.
- Maintain a clear beginning, middle, and end based on the sequence.
- Tie the events together smoothly to form a cohesive narrative.

A sample acceptable response might include:

- Nora waking up excited and getting ready.
- Describing the bike ride and the quiet morning setting.
- Showing curiosity about the crowd.
- Explaining how she reacts to seeing the volunteers and the baby sea turtle.
- Ending by describing her feelings as the turtle enters the water.

Teacher's Guide

- Remind students that timelines provide **structure**, but writers must add descriptive elements to make a narrative engaging.
- Encourage students to think about sensory details and character reactions.

Differentiation Tips

- Provide a list of transition words for students who need support.
- Offer sentence starters for each event for hesitant writers.

Engagement Ideas

- Invite students to share one sentence from their story that expanded the simplest timeline event.
- Compare how different students interpret the same timeline to show creativity.
- Have students create their own timelines and swap with classmates to convert into narratives.
