Q1. How many lines?

10 lines.

Q2. Rhyme scheme:

ABAB CDCD EE.

Q3. Poetic form:

The poem is written in a sonnet-like form, though shortened (10 lines instead
of the traditional 14). It resembles a variation of a sonnet with a closing
rhymed couplet.

Q4. How does structure reinforce meaning?

The structured rhyme and rhythm mirror the regular tolling of the clocktower
 bell, emphasizing the theme of time's steady, unchanging nature.

Q5. Bonus (answers will vary):

 Rewriting in free verse would make the poem feel less controlled and more reflective, but it might lose the sense of order that matches the clock's rhythm.

Teacher Notes:

- Point out that not all poems fit perfectly into one form; variations exist.
- Emphasize that identifying form helps students see how structure connects to theme.
- Extension idea: Give students multiple short poems (e.g., a haiku, a limerick, a free verse stanza) and ask them to sort by form.
