Quake Case Study Answer Key

- 1. **Primary** The handwritten letter is a firsthand account written by someone who directly experienced the event.
- 2. **Primary** The photographs were taken at the time, serving as direct visual evidence of the destruction.
- 3. **Secondary** The modern history textbook summarizes and interprets past events for readers.
- 4. **Secondary** The documentary offers analysis and interpretation, even though it may include primary materials.
- 5. **Primary** The 1906 newspaper article was published immediately after the event, making it a direct record from that time.
- 6. **Secondary** The biography is written later, interpreting and retelling the mayor's role in the event.

Teacher's Notes:

- This case study helps students see how researchers often use both source types together to build a strong project.
- Point out that time and perspective matter: the closer to the actual event,
 the more likely it is to be primary.
- Encourage students to notice "mixed" sources: a newspaper written at the time = primary, while a biography written years later = secondary, even though both tell about the same people and event.
- Extension activity: Have students create their own short case study on a
 recent event (school sports game, local celebration, or news event), then
 list one primary and one secondary source they could use.
