

## Suffrage Source Study Answer Key

1. **The pamphlet is a Primary Source.**
  - Historians value it because it provides direct evidence of how suffragists expressed their ideas and persuaded others at the time.
2. **The speech recording is a Primary Source.**
  - It allows researchers to experience the exact words and emotional delivery of a suffragist, offering insight into how messages were communicated.
3. **The history book is a Secondary Source.**
  - It is helpful because it gives context, connects events, and explains broader historical patterns beyond what one pamphlet or speech can show.
4. **The online article is a Secondary Source.**
  - It helps by analyzing differences among states, giving Elena interpretations and explanations that primary sources alone might not reveal.
5. **Using both together strengthens research.**
  - Primary sources provide raw, firsthand evidence, while secondary sources help interpret and connect those details. Together, they give both **authentic voices** from the past and **modern understanding** of larger historical trends.

### Teacher's Notes:

- This activity focuses on **critical reasoning**, not just labeling. Students must explain **why** a researcher would use each type of source.
- Encourage students to go beyond "it's primary/secondary" and think about the **purpose** of each source.
- Extension idea: Have students pick a topic they're studying and write one example of a primary source and one secondary source they could use, along with why each would matter.
