

## From Cause to Cure Answer Key

- **Cause**

1. Heavy rain poured for three days without stopping.
2. Sam forgot to charge his tablet before school.
3. A strong wind knocked down several power lines.

- **Problem**

2. The basement flooded, and the carpet was ruined.
5. He couldn't open his digital textbook in class.
8. The neighborhood lost electricity for hours.

- **Solution**

3. The family used a pump to drain the water.
6. His teacher gave him a printed worksheet instead.
9. Workers repaired the lines and restored power.

### Extension (Sample Answers):

- Instead of draining water with a pump, the family could have called an emergency cleanup service.
- Instead of using a printed worksheet, Sam could have borrowed a classmate's tablet.
- Instead of repairing the power lines right away, neighbors could have used flashlights and generators.

### Teacher Notes:

- Stress that **cause** → **problem** → **solution** is a logical chain. The cause sparks the problem, and the solution resolves it.
- Let students discuss why some sentences might look like both a cause and a problem; guide them to pick the "starting point" vs. the "result."
- Differentiate by first sorting as a class, then letting advanced students create their own short cause-problem-solution sets.
