• Your Claim: The accused should have been pardoned earlier because many were innocent and evidence was unreliable.

• Evidence:

- o Spectral evidence was used unfairly, leading to wrongful convictions.
- Some leaders (like Governor Phips) eventually recognized mistakes and stopped the court.
- **Opposing Viewpoint:** People feared witches and believed waiting kept the community safe.
