### Teacher Notes / Guide

- **Objective:** Students will learn how punctuation shapes the **rhythm, pauses, and emotional tone** of oral reading, improving both **expression** and **comprehension**.
- **Implementation Tips:**
  - Model each punctuation type aloud, exaggerating pauses for effect.
  - Ask students to “feel” the punctuation and how it changes the **voice and pacing**.
  - Encourage multiple readings: first for accuracy, second for emotion, third for fluency.
- **Extension Idea:**  
Have students rewrite one or two sentences by **changing punctuation** (e.g., turning a statement into a question or adding an exclamation) and reread to hear the difference.
- **Assessment Tip:**  
Listen for controlled pauses, natural tone, and expressive reading. Students should show awareness of how punctuation influences **intonation, phrasing, and sentence flow**.
