

Emotion Painter Answer Key

These are sample showing sentences. Student answers may vary.

1. Maya was excited: Maya bounced on her toes and spoke in a quick, bright voice.
2. Jordan felt nervous: Jordan kept twisting his fingers and glancing at the clock.
3. Ella was disappointed: Ella's shoulders slumped as she stared at the floor without speaking.
4. Leo felt proud: Leo stood tall with a wide smile as he held up his finished project.
5. Sam was confused: Sam squinted at the paper and kept rereading the question.

Teacher's Guide

- Use this worksheet to help students shift from **telling** to **showing** through concrete actions, descriptive details, and simple sensory cues.
- Encourage students to include **verbs that reveal emotion**, like trembled, perked up, slumped, or scanned.
- Remind students they do not need long sentences. Short, specific, vivid details work well.

Differentiation Tips

- Provide a word bank of strong verbs for students who need support.
- Offer sentence starters for emerging writers.

Engagement Ideas

- Read a few anonymous student sentences aloud and let the class guess the emotion.
- Challenge students to write two different showing sentences for the same emotion.

Extension Ideas

- Have students take a short telling paragraph and convert the entire thing into a fully showing version.
- Invite students to create a mini chart comparing telling vs. showing for three new emotions of their choice.
