A Native Perspective on Westward Expansion

For generations, Native American tribes lived on and cared for lands across the Great Plains and the West. Their communities formed strong relationships with nature, depending on the land for food, shelter, and cultural traditions. When settlers began moving west, the government forced many Native families to leave their homelands. Promises of peace or shared land were often broken. Tribes that had lived in one place for hundreds of years suddenly had to rebuild their lives far from sacred places and hunting grounds. Many Native people felt great loss-but they also showed courage by holding onto their identity, languages, and traditions in the face of change.
