## Teacher's Guide

- Remind students that entertainment can shape beliefs-encourage critical thinking about sources.
- Vocabulary support: portray, perspectives, symbol, identity, independence.
- Differentiation:
  - o Provide sentence starters such as "The show influenced people by..."
  - o Offer an optional Venn comparison of show vs. reality for advanced students (done verbally or in notes, not on worksheet).
- Engagement ideas:
  - Show students a brief, teacher-approved image or quote from Buffalo Bill's advertising posters to analyze representation.
  - o Group discussion: "What parts of history are we most likely to misunderstand from movies or shows?"
- Extension activities:
  - Students research a real person featured in the show (e.g., Sitting Bull, Annie Oakley) and compare their true story to their stage role.
  - Connect to media literacy standards: discuss why dramatic storytelling sometimes replaces accuracy.
