Hungry Monster Munch Answer Key

- Monster's mouth should be filled with small objects (e.g., pom-poms or paper bits).
- All colors represented if available (red, blue, yellow, green, purple).
- Correct completion shows precise hand control and color recognition.

Teacher's Guide

- Model the action: "Pinch, lift, feed."
- Encourage gentle, slow placement for control instead of dumping.
- Reinforce vocabulary by naming each color or size before feeding.

Differentiation Ideas

- For beginners: use large pom-poms
- For advanced learners: use smaller items or add a sequence pattern (e.g., red-yellow-blue)
- Add a simple counting step: "Feed your monster five snacks."

Engagement Boosters

- Give each monster a silly name ("Munchy," "Giggles," or "Chomp").
- Make monster sound effects as students "feed" their pieces.
- Turn it into a group activity: each student feeds the monster one piece at a time.

Extension Activities

- After feeding, have students sort the "food" by color or size.
- Invite children to draw their own monster and glue on "food" pieces.
- Add a story prompt: "What happens when the monster eats too many snacks?"
