The Soldier's Voice:

Teacher's Guide

- **Differentiation Tips:**
 - For struggling readers, pre-teach key vocabulary such as *refugee*, *courage*, and *front lines*.
 - Allow students to read passages aloud in pairs or groups for better fluency and understanding.
 - For advanced learners, invite them to write a fourth "voice" from another perspective (e.g., a child or journalist).
- **Engagement Ideas:**
 - Conduct a "Voices Gallery Walk": students post written reflections or drawings inspired by each account.
 - Ask students to share which passage affected them the most and why.
- **Extension Ideas:**
 - Connect this activity to primary sources-students can research real WWII letters or diaries and compare tone and details.
 - Lead a class discussion on modern examples of bravery and resilience during global conflicts.
