## Object's Tale Answer Key

A correct response should include:

- A clear object narrator.
- Use of **first-person** point of view: I, me, my, mine.
- Details that make sense for the object's location, owner, and experiences.
- A narrative that describes an event from the object's unique perspective.

No single correct narrative is required because all student answers will vary.

### Teacher's Guide

- Remind students that objects cannot normally think or talk, but **personification** allows them to imagine an inner voice.
- Show examples of everyday objects and ask students to brainstorm what each one might see or go through.
- Encourage students to underline the pronouns they use to ensure the story stays in first person.
- For differentiation, provide sentence starters such as:
  - **I spend every day...**
  - **My owner always...**
  - **Today something surprising happened to me...**
- For engagement, allow students to bring in a classroom-safe object to inspire their story.
- Extension idea: Have students rewrite the same event in **third person** to compare how the point of view changes the story's voice.
