Prompt Dissection: What Makes a Strong Prompt?
When you give instructions to AI, the way you <b>build your prompt</b> determines how helpful the answer will be. Strong prompts usually include several key elements:
Task: What do you want the AI to do? (Explain, compare, list, write a story, etc.)
Context: Background information or details that focus the response.
Format: The type of response you want (essay, list, article, story, dialogue, etc.).
Constraints: Boundaries such as length, number of examples, or reading level.
<b>Audience:</b> Who the writing should be aimed at (kids, teens, adults, experts, general readers, etc.).
<b>Instructions -</b> Read each prompt carefully. <b>Underline or label</b> the parts of the prompt that show the <b>Task</b> , <b>Context</b> , <b>Format</b> , <b>Constraints</b> , <b>and Audience</b> . After marking, answer the reflection questions.
