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A Kitchen Scene Answer Key

Answers will vary, but strong responses should include:

- Identification of vague words such as nice, busy, lots of sounds, smells, looked good, seemed to like.
- Replacement of vague or abstract phrases with specific sensory observations.
- Use of concrete details involving sight, sound, and smell.

Example of a strong rewrite: The kitchen was bright with the warm glow from hanging lights. Pots clattered on the stove while someone chopped vegetables on a wooden board. The air smelled like baking bread mixed with garlic and herbs. Plates filled with steaming food covered the counter as people talked and laughed softly.

Teacher's Guide

Purpose: To strengthen students' ability to revise vague writing by adding sensory details rooted in real, observable elements.

Teaching Tips:

- Model identifying vague language by highlighting general words like nice or good.
- Encourage students to visualize a real kitchen and list concrete details using sight, sound, and smell.
- Emphasize the difference between sensory details and emotional interpretations.

Extension Ideas:

- Ask students to apply the same rewriting technique to a paragraph from their own past writing.
- Have students compare two sensory rewrites and discuss which details created clearer imagery.
- Invite students to write a second expanded paragraph focusing on a different setting such as a hallway or playground.
