Student responses will vary. A strong reconstruction paragraph must include:

- References to all or most of the provided details: shattered glass, the overturned lamp, late-afternoon sunlight, scattered papers, and the partly open window.
- No invented characters, causes, interpretations, or background information.
- Vivid and precise description based solely on sight, texture, light, or spatial arrangement.
- Concrete sensory language directly connected to the given details.

Teacher's Guide

Purpose: To help older students learn to reconstruct atmosphere and visual context using only verifiable observational clues rather than assumptions or invented narrative.

Teaching Tips:

- Model how to expand a detail without adding invented information. For example, "shattered glass" can be expanded into shape, reflections, or distribution.
- Emphasize that **interpretation is limited**. Students must not explain who caused the scene or why it happened.
- Encourage students to focus on spatial arrangement, lighting, textures, and motion that can be directly inferred from the raw details.

Differentiation:

- Provide a list of sensory verbs and vivid adjectives for students who need support.
- Allow students to annotate the detail list before writing to clarify what each detail offers.

Engagement Idea:

• Turn this into a collaborative warm-up where small groups generate observation-based sentences from the same detail list.
